Greater Appreciation and Improved Communication




Dementia significantly impacts a person’s senses. It changes how people see, hear, taste, feel and smell. It also changes how they interact with others and the world around them. In this session, you will gain a better understanding and appreciation of the sensory changes that frequently accompany dementia as well as simple tips and techniques you can use improve to your communication skills.
